In-Class Notes Assignment

You will turn in handwritten notes for each day of class lecture/discussion and for the READ|WATCH items on days we are working online.

HOW TO TAKE NOTES IN A SKILLS CLASS

Any writing class, much like math or reading, is a skills class. Instead of learning facts and dates, you are learning *how to do something*. As such, taking notes in a skills class requires you to focus on *what to do* and *how to do it*. As we go through the course, this is at the heart of our study. I expect your notes to become more thorough and thoughtful as the semester progresses and I will grade more strictly as we move toward the end.

WHAT AND HOW

As you take notes, focus on what and how. Here are some examples and tips:

- Discussion of assignments/writing
 - What is required
 - What key things make it stand out
 - What things are not allowed
 - Due dates
 - Processes and steps
- Sample Essays
 - o Format
 - Key parts/sections
 - Successful techniques
 - Specific wording or elements required
 - Examples that stand out

- Grammar
 - Basic rules in your own words
 - Tests or rules for checking grammar
 - Examples that stand out
- Other things that stand out as significant
- Anything your teacher repeats
- Keywords and concepts
- Questions you have for me
- Ideas that come to you for assignments you're working on.

Integrate your own style. If drawing lines, arrows, sketches, or other things help you, then do that.


You may find it useful to use the list under "What we'll do in class" on the schedule as a starting outline for your daily notes, though you should include any other things discussed as well.



GRADING & CREDIT

GRADING STANDARDS

Your notes will be graded on capturing major points and details for the day, asking questions, and generally showing that you're intellectually interacting with the class.

This will count toward both your coursework and participation grade. It is also the way I take attendance after the first week.

CSD NOTE TAKING

If you qualify for a note-take through CSD, you need to take what notes you can during class/class videos and as you read, then you need to highlight or annotate the notes from the CSD notetaker. Your notes on the notetaker's notes should show that you've done more than just read through them; they should show you have thought about the significant points and added any thoughts, ideas, or things you noted.

Discuss this with me. If you don't take time to talk with me about this, I won't make any modifications. It's your responsibility to communicate with me.

EXTRA CREDIT

If you take notes on homework readings and videos, you can earn up to 20 points extra credit.

To get credit, clearly label those sections with "Homework" and give the title of the homework reading/video at the start of your notes for it.

Additionally, I may add extra credit points for notes that are exemplary.

TURNING NOTES IN

No matter how you turn them in, make sure they are organized and clearly labeled as discussed above.

I WILL NOT GRADE UNORGANIZED AND/OR UNLABELED NOTES.

IN-CLASS

Notes should be turned in as you leave class. If you need a copy of your notes, please take a picture of them before handing them in. They will also be used to take attendance. If you are in class but do not take notes and turn them in, you will not be considered present if you don't at least turn in a piece of paper with your name on it.

I generally return notes to you by the next class period.

WHEN ABSENT

If you cannot attend class in person, you should watch the recording before our next class and take notes. Turn those notes in during the next class period. If you are going to be absent for more than one day and you know in advance, talk to me about this.
