- 3. What do you learn about the main character from his actions or speeches or from the actions or speeches about him? What does this show you about the human condition, circumstance, or the theme of the work?
- 4. This story is told looking back on the past. How does this character feel about his behavior growing up? How can you tell, and what does it show about the process of accepting our families and ourselves?
- 5. How does the pace of the story—the slowness or quickness of actions and events—create a specific feel or effect?
- 6. What are the various tones of the story, and how does the movement from one tone to the next create a specific feeling or effect?
- 7. Paper is a clear symbol in this story. What does it represent, and what is the underlying message in that connection?
